The Season of Lent arrives early this year and will conclude before the end of March. We begin the Lenten Season on Ash Wednesday, February 10th and the Celebration of Easter is on March 27th. Lent is a time for us to consider our commitment of discipleship for the Kingdom of Jesus Christ. It is a time when we remember the Lord's preparation of his disciples for his Passion and to reflect on our response to his gracious sacrifice for our sin that we might glorify him. Throughout the Season of Lent this year we will be celebrating our call to discipleship and consider what it takes to foster discipleship in this age of the church's mission for Jesus the Christ.

Pastor's Corner



Embodied Disciples

of Jesus here on earth.

I invite you to use the upcoming season of Lent as a time of preparation for you to be an embodied disciple of Jesus here on earth as we seek to "Serve God and Love All" as a community of faith. Our mission statement proclaims that we want to "foster a community of disciples...", therefore we must learn what a community of disciples is and how we can foster what the community will do as disciples of the Kingdom of Jesus Christ. Therefore, let us consider this Lenten season as a time of preparation to receive the Holy Spirit to empower our lives to be a community of disciples according to the purpose of Jesus.

The disciples were the ones that Jesus was preparing for the Holy Spirit to take up residence in to create an outbreak of God's presence in the world. As such, we are the ones where God's Spirit comes to rest – but not for rest but to be empowered for service. Within us, God stirs, God meddles, God provokes, God comforts, God embraces, and God forgives. The scriptures testify again and again to this persistent desire on God's part to infiltrate our bodies and souls, to take up presence in our inner selves. God desires to be within us that we might know him deeply rather than just as an omnipotent Creator. God has created us for relationship with him and he accomplishes this through his "personal" entrance into the flesh. He becomes one of us so

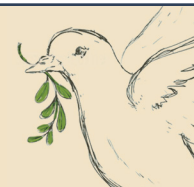
he may dwell with us. If we want to know what God looks like, we only have to look as far as the incarnate one, Jesus. He embodies the personality and being of God, the three in one! However, only God can make us disciples who love like Jesus, pray like Jesus, and believe like Jesus.

It all starts with our "inner being" where God transforms our souls, minds, hearts, and ultimately bodies to be disciples for the Kingdom. Only God can move us from being self-centered to Spirit-centered. Only God can turn hoarding hearts into helping hands. Only God can move us from apathy to genuine concern for people we come to see as our neighbors in the world. Only God can transform us in the process by being "under our skin". This adds a whole new level of understanding to what it means to be "in-spiring". Jesus worked with his disciples so they would be prepared to receive the Holy Spirit by knowing him and his way, his truth, and his life, so they too could live "in-spirited" lives as he did.

I invite you to use this upcoming season of Lent to examine your life of discipleship in response to the preparations of Jesus to make you a vessel for the Holy Spirit, as he prepared his first disciples to be invaded and occupied for the glory of God. Through our practices of prayer and partnership with Jesus we can develop a deeper

The Season of Lent begins with our observance of Ash Wednesday on February 10th. Lent is usually seen as a season of self-examination and contemplation for the disciples of the Kingdom of Jesus Christ so that we can better serve the Lord. During Lent we consider the purpose of the passion Jesus endured in order to usher in a new kingdom here on earth as it is in heaven. We typically review the events and activities that surround the final weeks of our Lord's life in order to more fully grasp the significance of not only his sacrifice on the cross but to prepare ourselves for the impact of the resurrection. For the first disciples it was a time of uncertainty and confusion as Jesus kept speaking about a "kingdom to come" and that he would have to leave in order for "the Advocate to come and dwell with you forever." (John 14: 16). He in essence was preparing the disciples not only for his crucifixion and resurrection, but also for the indwelling of the Holy Spirit to empower their ministry and mission for the new Kingdom of Jesus Christ here on earth. Jesus used his final weeks on earth to prepare his disciples for the beginning phases of their service as the embodied disciples

sense of where and when the Spirit is present and the Lord is active in the world, so we can be energized and empowered to participate in the privilege we are given as his chosen disciples. As the embodied beings of the Lord, we are created to live God's presence at all times, in all places, and under all circumstances. In this manner, "God can accomplish abundantly far more than we can imagine," which is the verse that follows the prayer offered by the Apostle Paul and is my prayer for our congregation through this upcoming season of Lent.

I pray that according to the riches of his glory, [God] may grant that you may be strengthened in your inner being with power through [God's] Spirit, and that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith, as you are being rooted and grounded in love. I pray that you may have the power to comprehend, with all the saints, what is the breadth and length and depth, and to know the love of Christ that surpasses knowledge, so that you may be filled with all the fullness of God.

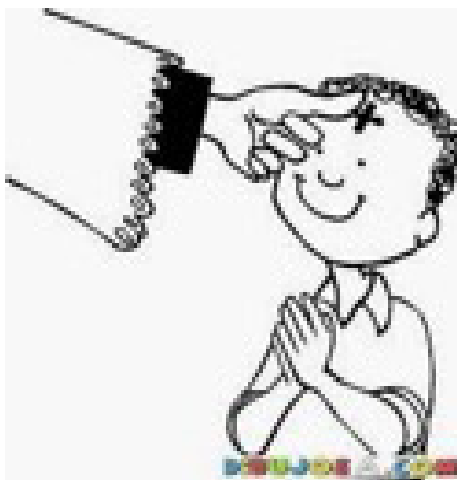

So....we are again asking families to deliver the soup to these members and put a smile on their faces.

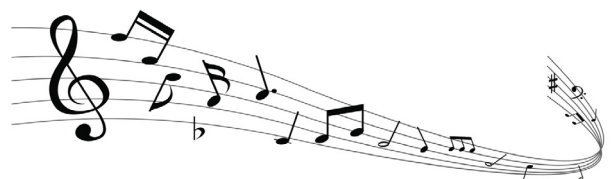

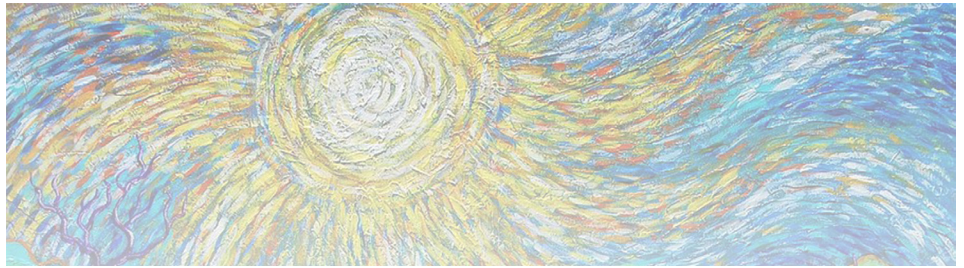
Scripture & The Arts Event

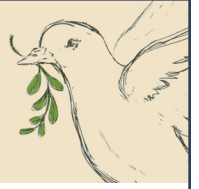

Our Sincerest Gratitude...

The Congregation and Council would like to thank those who gave anonymous gifts in 2015. These contributions include:

1) A \$16,300 donation, which we challenged the congregation to match. The matching campaign entitled, "Close the Gap", helped raise an additional \$13,000 in order to offset the 2015 deficit.

Thank you for your "Close the Gap" matching gifts, which totaled around \$13,000 to combine with the \$16,300 gift to help offset the deficit for 2015.

2) We received a very generous donation of audio visual equipment and computers. This gift includes the 7 monitors placed throughout the church that broadcast the Power Point announcements. These monitors will greatly enhance communication and education capabilities. A Mac Book Pro was donated in support of our efforts to improve all communication mediums.

3) Various gifts were donated in support of music at Wallace, including inviting musicians

and vocalist to perform. Contributions were also made to Christmas and Easter programs.

4) Others designated gifts for the courtyard columbarium, mission projects - including local, national and worldwide, nursery school scholarships, and the food pantry.

Food Pantry Update



December Was an OUTSTANDING Month for the Wallace Food Pantry!

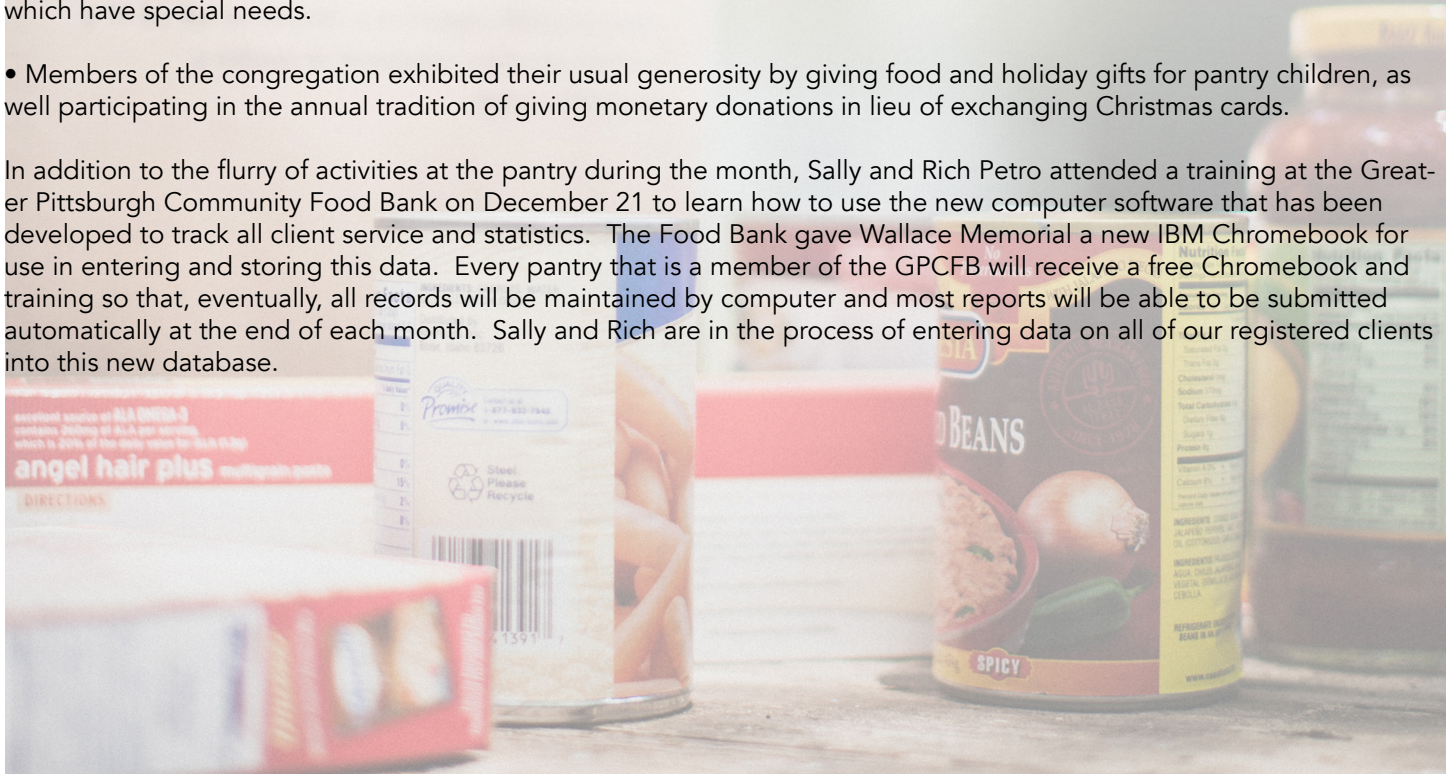
During the month of December, 2015, the Wallace Food Pantry served a total of 136 clients from 66 different families. *Of those served, 37 (27%) were age 17 and under, 18 (13%) were age 60+; and 44 (32%) were legally disabled.* Two new client families were registered and served in December, with a total of 7 members.

In addition to their regular food orders, each family received a \$15 Giant Eagle gift card provided by the Greater Pittsburgh Community Food Bank through its annual Turkey Fund drive. Clients also were given Christmas Dinner Bags with side dishes for their Christmas dinners, a gift (a festive penguin or snowman oven mitt plus a calendar from Slater Funeral Home), and gifts for every child age 17 and under.

Additionally Wallace Food Pantry was the beneficiary of much generosity during December:

- PennDot's Engineering Division in Bridgeville held its annual food drive for Wallace on December 7. PennDot's suppliers and employees donated a total of \$3,295 plus several thousand pounds of food and paper products.
- On Wednesday, December 16, the Life Skills Class from Chartier's Valley Intermediate School returned to volunteer, with 7 students and 5 teachers and aides coming to sort bags, individually bag bottles of laundry detergent, and sort cases of candy for distribution at Easter time. These hard-working young people enjoyed a pizza luncheon before returning to school that afternoon. These students will be returning in January to volunteer once again.
- Later in December, The Table group of young adults from Wallace went shopping for the pantry, purchasing much-needed toiletries, cereal, soup, diapers and wipes, adult protective undergarments, and laundry detergent for pantry clients.
- The 4-7 year old Sunday School Class decorated paper bags and then filled them with toiletry items, then delivered them to the pantry on December 20.
- Several people from the community donated Walmart and Giant Eagle gift cards, which were passed on to families which have special needs.
- Members of the congregation exhibited their usual generosity by giving food and holiday gifts for pantry children, as well participating in the annual tradition of giving monetary donations in lieu of exchanging Christmas cards.

In addition to the flurry of activities at the pantry during the month, Sally and Rich Petro attended a training at the Greater Pittsburgh Community Food Bank on December 21 to learn how to use the new computer software that has been developed to track all client service and statistics. The Food Bank gave Wallace Memorial a new IBM Chromebook for use in entering and storing this data. Every pantry that is a member of the GPCFB will receive a free Chromebook and training so that, eventually, all records will be maintained by computer and most reports will be able to be submitted automatically at the end of each month. Sally and Rich are in the process of entering data on all of our registered clients into this new database.



Interfaith Exploration



A Special Report from the Interfaith Exploration Group...

On Tuesday, January 26th members of Wallace met with members from SS Simon and Jude church to brainstorm ways that our congregations could work together to increase understanding of and respect for one another's faith traditions; to highlight commonalities in our beliefs and expressions of faith; and to enhance the discipleship journeys of all involved. The effort between Wallace and SS Simon and Jude is seen as a starting point, with the hope that, over time, additional faith traditions will be added into the mix.

Everyone was very enthusiastic about the many opportunities for interaction between the two congregations. Opportunities discussed include:

- A sharing of information about one another's programs in each other's bulletins, so that members of the other congregation would be welcome to attend.
- Fr. Jay invited Wallace members to come to SS Simon and Jude on Friday, March 18 to participate in the fish fry and a joint Stations of the Cross at 7pm. He mentioned having Wallace's choir there to provide music, as well as having Wallace Members do some of the readings.
- Having the Youth groups of the two congregations interact and be involved in joint activities was also discussed.
- SSJ also invited Wallace members to a viewing of The Passion of the Christ on Wednesday, March 23 at SS Simon and Jude.

Once we have more details about this, it should go into Wallace's bulletin, and show the details of the fish fry/ Stations of the Cross event. Again, this may be an activity the youth would want to do as well.

This is an exciting new opportunity to enhance our outreach into the community and to have our own faith experience enhanced through programming at and with SS Simon and Jude.



We have been invited to the SS Simon and Jude Fish Fry on March 18th from 4:00pm - 7:00pm, followed by Stations of the Cross at 7:00pm. Our neighbors are just down the street at 1607 Greentree Rd.



Saint Simon and Jude has also invited Wallace members to their viewing of Mel Gibson's The Passion of the Christ on Wednesday, March 23rd at 7:00pm - 9:00pm. The powerful movie can be difficult to watch, yet is deeply moving on a spiritual level.
