"Walk as One at 1"

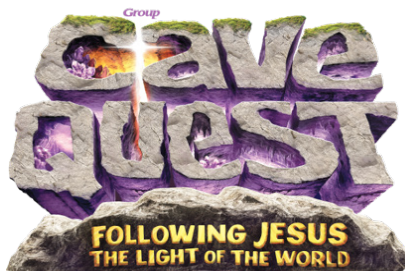

Mission and Outreach



For over 30 years, the Wallace Food Pantry has provided nourishment and encouragement to families from our area. A member agency of the Greater Pittsburgh Community Food Bank, Wallace Food Pantry serves about 110-140 individuals from 55-70 families each month. Eligibility for service is based on income (with the cutoff level for eligibility being set by the State of Pennsylvania at 150% of the poverty level) and geography (clients must live in Wallace's service area of Green Tree, Dormont, and those parts of Pittsburgh, Scott, Mt Lebanon, Crafton Heights, and Westwood for which we are the closest pantry). The pantry serves not only people in the wider community, but also a number of Wallace's members and friends.

Wallace's Pantry is open every Tuesday except for holidays, and clients are welcome to select for themselves the Tuesday on which they want to come in for their monthly pickup. In addition to bags of non-perishable staples, such as cereal, juice, spaghetti, tuna, vegetables, soups, and macaroni and cheese, client families also receive bags of bread and desserts, a selection of dairy products, their choice of a wide array of frozen meats, poultry, and fish, and at least 3 types of fresh produce, as well as bath tissue and either laundry or dish detergent. Special needs such as for diapers, baby food, and adult protective undergarments, are also met. Amounts of food given to clients increase as family size increases, but all clients, regardless of family

size, are given ample quantities of food which should last them at least a week to ten days. On average, volunteers pick up 1,200 pounds of food each week from the Greater Pittsburgh Community Food Bank to distribute to the families served.

Wallace's ministry of food and compassion serves people who are facing a wide variety of challenges in their lives. Each month, about 20-25% of



those served are children age 17 and under; approximately 20% are adults age 60 and over; and almost 40% are legally disabled. Of those who are legally disabled, client impairments include mental health, developmental, and physical disabilities. Many of these clients have special dietary needs that are related to their disabilities; Wallace is committed to meeting those unique needs by procuring special foods and supplements as necessary and/or by packing special sets of groceries. Wallace also serves clients who are employed, but whose income is too low to support themselves and their families.

At any given time, Wallace generally has about 80-85 families registered as clients of our pantry. Because the pantry is open weekly, we serve a smaller number of clients at one time than do most pantries. As a result, we are able to take extra time with our clients, getting to know them, their families, and their unique needs, in an intimate way. This enables our wonderful volunteers, who come from Wallace as well as from other churches in our community, to form caring bonds with those whom we serve. We pray for our clients and this ministry each Tuesday before opening our doors, and clients often ask us to pray for their specific needs or health problems.

In addition to their regular, monthly food, families served at Wallace receive other, special items throughout the year. For Easter, Thanksgiving, and Christmas, clients receive a holiday dinner bag filled with side dishes and dessert mix, as well as a gift card to purchase their holiday meat (the Food Bank provides KDKA Turkey Vouchers for all clients at Thanksgiving or Christmas). In June, families with school-age children receive a School Lunch Bag for each child. Many of our pantry children receive free school lunches which end in the summer; our School Lunch Bags filled with peanut butter, tuna, macaroni and cheese, and more help families bridge this food gap. And in August, pantry children receive backpacks filled with school supplies to give them a strong start to the school year. The pantry also provides games and books for each child at Christmas.

Approximately 75% of the food distributed through Wallace Food Pantry is obtained through the Greater Pittsburgh Community Food Bank.



As a Food Bank member, Wallace is allotted a certain quantity of free state and federal food each month. To supplement those allocations, Wallace purchases additional food, as well as cleaning and paper products, from the Food Bank. In general, the cost of these items through the Food Bank is lower--in some cases, dramatically lower--than similar products would cost in the community. Special items can be purchased for almost nothing, such as fresh produce for \$.03 a pound and frozen meat and poultry for \$.10 per pound. The rest of the items distributed through our pantry come from donations given by Giant Eagle at Parkway Center Mall (which generously provides bread and baked goods to Wallace two days each week), church members, and community groups (including the Dormont AARP, Bower Hill Community Church, Mt. Lebanon Jr. Women's Club, Mt. Lebanon Girl Scouts, Penn-Dot, and many more), or from pantry volunteers purchasing needed items that are not available through the Food Bank from community stores (an example is diapers, which are rarely available from the Food Bank).

Most of the funding for the pantry comes from Wallace members through financial gifts on Pantry Sunday and/or through the Christmas Greeting Card program in which members donate to Wallace Food Pantry in lieu of purchasing and sending cards to one another. By having the pantry located in the church, commercial rental space is not needed. This support is valued at about \$3200 per month. Financial support also comes from community groups and individuals who donate food, gift cards, holiday toys and gift wrap, and school supplies.

Of course, this ministry would not

be possible without the dozens of dedicated volunteers who support the pantry. Currently, there are about 40 volunteers who regularly assist with picking up, sorting, bagging, and distributing food, and cleaning up after distribution is complete. In addition, several community groups also provide regular volunteers throughout the year, including the Mt. Lebanon Jr. Women's Club, several Brownie and Girl Scout troops from Mt. Lebanon, and the students and teachers of the Life Skills Class at Chartiers Valley Intermediate School. New volunteers are always welcome; interested people can contact Nadine Eichenmiller at 412-937-9097.

This ministry of caring, concern, compassion, and feeding is based on Wallace Memorial's strong commitment to mission outreach to those in need throughout our community.

Wallace's members have provided outstanding resources and support which enable the pantry to provide thousands of pounds of food each month to our neighbors.

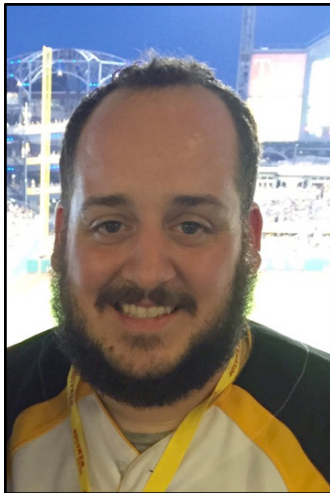

Spring Fling Brings Cheer to Nursing Home Residents

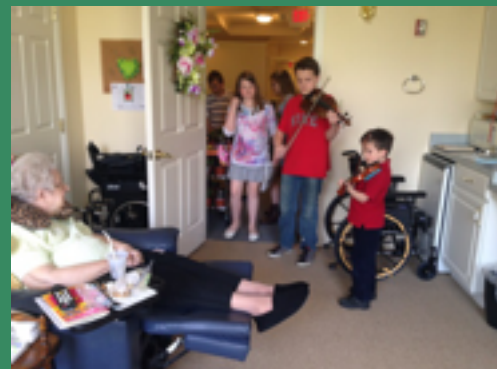

Maggie Horgan -
Writer, Speaker,

Author of "Heartifacts: When a Child Dies, Love Remains"

Topic: A message of hope for
parents and siblings facing a loss
that no person should have to
bear: the loss of a child.

Shortly after her blindsiding divorce, Maggie's son, Niel, was diagnosed with Ewing's Sarcoma his senior year at Mt. Lebanon High School. Nearly two years later, this rare form of pediatric bone cancer took his life. As a single parent of three other children,

Maggie desperately needed to find a way to go on, to find a way to support her children through a traumatic divorce and the unimaginable loss of their deeply loved and admired brother - all the while still reeling with her own grief.

Oddly help soon showed up in the most unexpected place, in the form of a heart-shaped stone. And then the hearts kept manifesting, until their message became impossible to ignore. Maggie's experience has a universal appeal in that it presents strong evidence that we do go on after death, and the love of our lost ones is eternal, both in this world and the next. No matter what your beliefs, at the very least, Maggie's story illustrates how one can make the journey back from paralyzing sorrow to "life and love". Although the journey is continuous, it is possible.

In her book, Maggie states that grief of this magnitude becomes a spiritual battle, and relief from her pain came only through a very spiritual experience. She is cautious however in relaying her narrative, as she is afraid of scaring away those who have trouble believing in a higher power, and a spiritual dimension of existence.

"I make sure there is something helpful in my message for every-

one." Maggie states. She goes on to say that at the very least, the heart-shaped rocks and other heart symbols that kept appearing after Neil's death, are great metaphor for the weight of grief on the human heart. Perhaps they are just coincidental. Perhaps they are something always present in the environment, that a grieving mother simply tended to notice more as she tried to comprehend her loss. Even so, the message of hope they symbolize is still healing.

For those of faith, the events captured in Maggie's book, "reinforce some powerful and reassuring spiritual truths:

True love is forever.
God is attentive.
Heaven is interactive.
We, on Earth, have divine helpers."

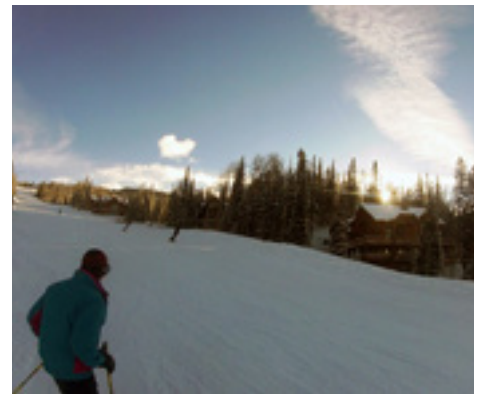
Lastly, and most importantly, Maggie wants grieving parents and other members of her audience to know writing *Heartifacts* was a challenge because her experience was so deeply personal. However, her motivation for putting it on paper comes from pure intentions and a desire to help others, in first chapter she states:

"I have been cautious about bringing *Heartifacts* to the general public for another very specific reason. Portions of it were provided to me spiritually, and I was not prepared for that eventuality. Throughout these passages, I suspect I have documented inspiration from the spirit of my deceased son, God's Holy Spirit or a blending of both. Honestly, I am not sure. What I am certain of is this: I have written from a sincere and humble heart. I never planned to become a speaker or an author - or an ambassador of hope for grieving parents. Life brought me to this juncture and filled my spirit with the following message: *it is possible to heal from the most virulent grief imaginable.*"

Maggie holds a degree in Health Planning and Administration from Penn State. She is a frequently requested speaker at the Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh. Maggie has also shared her message of hope and compassion with audiences at Mercy Hospital of Pittsburgh, the Pittsburgh Institute of Noetic Sciences, and with American military veterans. As noted on the back cover of her book: "She considers *Heartifacts* to be her fifth baby as it was created in collaboration with Heaven and is a manifestation of love."
