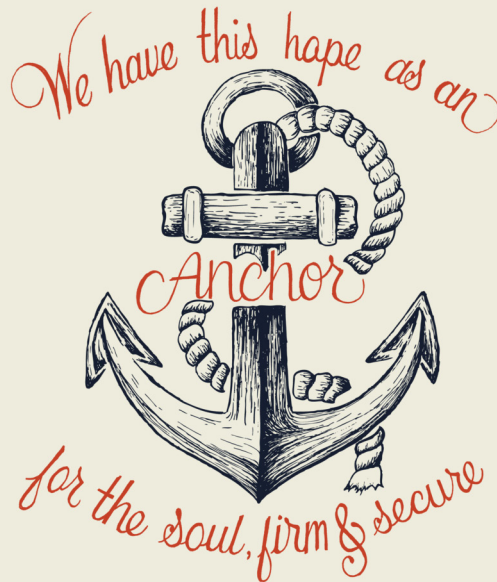

Pastor's Corner



"We have this hope, this sure and steadfast anchor of the soul..."

Hebrews 6:19

Jesus' first disciples were fishermen and knew how to sail a boat. Yet, there were times when even the sea became rough and they became frightened by what they were experiencing on the sea. On one occasion, Jesus is in a boat with his disciples, when a storm arises and out of fear they call upon the Lord, who is sleeping. He calms the storm and asks them, "Where is your faith?" On another occasion, they are on the sea and he comes to them walking on the water. They, of course, are afraid until Jesus says, "Do not be afraid, it is I." Peter then asks if he can join Jesus on the water, and begins to walk on the water, until he looks around and his faith wains and he begins to sink. Jesus reaches out to him and escorts him safely to the boat. The Apostle Paul was involved in more than one storm and became shipwrecked on one occasion.

Is it any wonder that boats and anchors have come to symbolize our faith in the Lord? We see many things that are disturbing, frightening, and even terrifying when we look around us. It is important for us to anchor our souls in the Lord, so we can deal with the topsy-turvy world and the things that toss us to and fro. It appears so

many of the things we are familiar with are unraveling, even in the church. The Psalmist declares, *"For God alone my soul waits in silence, for my hope is from him. He alone is my rock and my salvation, my fortress; I shall not be shaken."* (Psalm 62: 5-6) Hope is the anchor of the soul.

During the Summer Kids' Week, the children learned the song, *"My Hope is in the Lord."* The words hold a powerful message for all of us struggling with the unraveling of things we are familiar and comfortable with in our world.

*I can't help but feel a little down.
A little worried when I look around.
That's why my hope; my hope is in the Lord.
I fix my eyes on the God who gives.
'Cause all I need is what I have in Him.
That's why my hope; my hope is in the Lord.
I belong to Him.
He will never let me go.
My hope is in the Lord.
My hope is in the Lord.*

As we anchor our hope in the Lord, we also are looking to new horizons in order to move forward. Each day has a new horizon, but you cannot see what will happen beyond it. That is often why we look behind us, to the comfortable, to the known. It can therefore limit our vision. However, we must have faith that the One who created all things and loves us knows what is beyond the horizon and is looking out for us. If we anchor our hope in the Lord, we can look to the horizon in confidence that God will be with us. "Do not fear, I am with you, to the end of the age!"

It's hard to believe that we are thinking about school and our fall schedules!!! I can't stop thinking about the fall schedule because I am SO excited to start a new school year with NEW MUSIC MINISTRIES at WALLACE!!!!!!

Church Goer: How many ensembles can I participate in? I like to sing, I want to try the choirchimes AND what are these Orff instruments? Well, there will be groups for all ages starting in September.



On Wednesday afternoons from 4:00-4:45, grades 2-6 will meet with Ms. Sandy in a CHILDREN'S CHOIR opportunity. This will involve musical games, Orff instruments, rhythm instruments and learning about the special instrument that God gave each of us: our VOICE! The Children's Choir will sing approximately once a month, beginning in October.

REPORT By Sandy Rubright: What I learned from the Montreat Worship Conference based on GRACE and GRATITUDE:

Liturgy is as much an inspiration from the Word (heard with the ears), the music & Word (sung with the mouth), and the visual (seen with the eyes). This week made me ponder "What do we do well and will continue to grow in and Where are we lacking? Every opportunity to worship with other traditions, other churches and other professionals always makes me look at what I am doing as an educator, a leader and inspirer and a worker in the Kingdom.

I am thankful for Pastor Dennis' open-mindedness and creative spark and thankful for the Worship & Music committee who trusts its professionals in the fields. I see a need to fill the visual more purposefully. I'd like to see an element of ART in our service each week. The TABLE should be addressed or banners at least seasonally, or perhaps through the tree theme Doris did. I see this as a drawing to people, WHY did they drape blue and green today? Perhaps we are talking about the Baptism of our Lord with emphasis on water. It does not need to be elaborate but this church has such a calling to the ART element, much more than any congregation I have been in, that I think you need to form a Liturgical Art Team who works together and is part of the Worship and Music Team.

As this relates to the theme: GRACE and GRATITUDE; I see people dancing in the Light of God's Grace, arms extended taking that Grace in which is so freely given and exhaling our unending GRATITUDE!!

This fall, we have several opportunities to focus on gratitude, other than Thanksgiving, and I am really looking forward to those Sundays where our focus is on giving out of Thankfulness.

"In the Lord I'll be ever Thankful" is a great Taize hymn that is a simple chant reminding us that for this FREE gift of Grace, do I have much to be thankful for??? If so, do I thank daily? Do I thank only on Sunday? Doesn't He know I appreciate His Love and sacrifice? Or should I take the time to remind myself of the blessings I have received?

I want to pay attention more to the seasons and being creative with our Call to Worship with particular attention to the psalms, passing of the peace, an occasional Liturgical element such as Holy, Holy, Holy, Lord Have Mercy, or sung prayer responses such as we did a couple of Sundays ago. With the use of the screens coming in the fall, we can project the hymns from the CD that PCUSA has made available to help get our eyes out of the books and looking forward as a whole.

At the Montreat Conference, I was able to experience expert teachers in Handbells, Children's Choirs, creative youth participation, high school and Adult vocal technique experts and be reminded that I need to continue using my own creativity to involve very small instrumental parts to color the worship services, as much as possible. It is the conglomeration of ages, styles, and color both visually and aurally that lifts the soul. Without all these elements, it's like Dennis is sailing the ship all by himself. We are on the right path and need to continue to loosen the reins to allow responsive involvement from the people in the pews. You have much to offer, because God has given these gifts to you and we want everyone to be richer because of the experiences we share with one another. Ministry is a team effort, by both staff AND as a congregation.

I am very thankful for the opportunity to go to this conference. A conference of this caliber always lights a fire under me to remind me why I work in the church and how I have so much to give because of the grace I've been given and the gifts He has bestowed upon me. As a steward, In the Lord I am ever thankful and WANT to give more out of thankfulness.

Ian Cummins

*Nurse, (RN, BSN), UPMC Mercy's Psychiatric Emergency Room
Ian is most known for his walk across the United States in wake of his brother's suicide to raise money and awareness for mental illness.*

Topic: Mental Health and Suicide Awareness:

A Guide for Family Members and Friends of Those Who Suffer from Mental Illness.

SUNDAY, AUGUST 21st, 6:30pm - THE WALLACE CHAPEL

Ian's interactive workshop is targeted to those who have a close relationship with someone who suffers from mental illness. We encourage you to share your experience, yet will respect your privacy if you'd rather just observe. Since we are not mental health professionals, we can't diagnose or treat mental illness. However, all are welcome! If you think you have a problem with mental illness, we will share available resources to help you.

We will explore an overview of mental illnesses -from neurosis to personality disorders to psychosis - and explain how these disorders impact not only the sufferer, but those around them. We will discuss coping methods and support available to the friends and family members. The warning signs of suicide will also be covered.

Lastly, Ian will share his remarkable journey, which turned out to be a touching illustration of how we are not alone.

So many people across the United States joined him along the way, people whose lives were, in some way, impacted by suicide. Ian is an awe-inspiring example of how we can transform tragedy into something life-affirming.



IAN'S JOURNEY

You may recognize Ian from the news. KDKA followed him on his astonishing six month walk across the United States to raise money for the Southern Western PA branch of National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI). His goal was not only to "battle mental illness through awareness", but also channel his intense grief into something positive.

Ian's brother, Ryan James Cummins, was his youngest and only sibling. They were fairly close in age, with only about three or four years between them. This in turn often made them gleeful partners in crime during the adventures of their youth - silly mishaps typical of most lively young boys. Aside from being a little mischievous, both Ryan and Ian seemed to have an innate kindness, and sense of altruism. They were naturally talented in academics, appearing to have very bright futures on their horizons.

Ian went on to become a psychiatric nurse at UPMC, but in his teens Ryan began to mysteriously fall apart. He was plagued by an inability to concentrate, depression and anxiety. Of course Ryan did experience occasional moments of happiness in his life, but they were elusive and fleeting. However these symptoms inexplicably appeared to be more superficial manifestations of a deeper underlying problem that mystified doctors. He was given one different diagnoses after another, each coming with a brand new psych med and course of treatment.

Ryan eventually grew fed up of the prescription medications, which he felt only helped him temporarily, before just making him feel even worse. During his freshman year of college Ryan weened himself off of the drugs, and appeared functional yet dead pan. An eerie apathy seemed to cloud his persona, and though his family tried hard, it seemed there was little they could do to impact the way he felt. It was a very perplexing and helpless feeling for them, yet Ryan's discomfort had become the norm for all of them for years.

Leaving no clues that were obvious at the time, Ryan took his life on November 9, 2013. In his honor, Ian decided to embark on a cross-country trek to raise money for the local branch of NAMI and increase awareness that mental illness is a disease just like any physical ailment that can plague the body. However, since it's origins can be much more elusive, and the control of the disease appears to be more in the hands of the sufferer, it is often misunderstood. It can be harder to develop understanding and empathy for something that seems to be "all in your head".

Overall, the mission of Ian's walk, which he states on his blog, is to let people know that "If you have lost a loved one to suicide or are suffering on a regular basis with suicidal thoughts, you are NOT alone! Do not be afraid to share your story with others! Your personal experiences and/or association with mental illness will be the key for the future of awareness and understanding."

Ian began his six-month journey in Virginia Beach on March 1, 2014. He walked across 10 states, spreading Ryan's ashes along the way, and culminated his mission on the beach in San Francisco on August 30, 2014. There, walking into the Pacific ocean in his tennis shoes, he sprinkled more of Ryan's ashes with their father by his side.

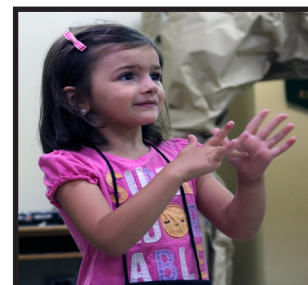
